The second principal part is the past form. It may also be called the simple past form. This form is used for the past tense.

Be sure to spell past forms correctly. Study the following rules for spelling the past forms of regular verbs.

 a. For most regular verbs, simply add -ed to the present form.

Present: We help Mother with the dishes.

Past: We helped Mother with the dishes.

b. If a verb ends with e, drop the e before adding -ed.

Present: The twins like chocolate ice cream.

Past: The twins liked chocolate ice cream.

 c. If a verb ends with y after a consonant, change the y to i and add -ed.

Present: The pupils study the countries of Africa.

Past: They studied the countries of Asia last year.

d. If a verb ends with y after a vowel, simply add -ed.

Present: We enjoy watching the birds.

Past: We enjoyed watching the birds.

 If a one-syllable verb ends with a single consonant after a short vowel, double the final consonant before adding -ed.

Present: The girls rub soap over the clothes.

Past: The girls rubbed soap over the clothes.

Notice how verb tenses are different from verb forms. Different verb tenses are the different times that verbs tell about

Teach the following points.

- A verb has three principal parts. These are the three main forms of a verb, and they are used for various tenses.
- The first principal part is the present form.
 This form is used for the present tense of a verb.

3. The second principal part is the past form. (It was called the simple past form in grade 4.) The past form is used for the past tense.

Past forms must be spelled correctly.

 a. For most regular verbs, simply add -ed to the present form.

helped

b. If a verb ends with e, drop the e before adding -ed.

d. If a verb ends with y after a vowel, simply add -ed.

stay-stayed enjoy-enjoyed

e. If a one-syllable verb ends with a single consonant after a short vowel, double the final consonant before adding -ed.

drag-dragged rub-rubbed

4. The third principal part is the past participle. (It was called the helper form in grade 4.) This form often tells about something that has already happened and is finished.

In regular verbs, the past participle is formed in the same way as the past form: by adding -ed to
