(present, past, and future). Different verb forms are the different spellings that are used to show different tenses.

The third principal part of verbs is the past participle. It may also be called the helper form. This form often tells about something that has already happened and is finished.

In regular verbs, the past participle is spelled the same as the past form. Both forms are made by adding -ed to the present form. The helping verb have, has, or had must be used with the past participle.

I have signed my name.

Karen has cleaned her room.

Charles had answered correctly.

* Remember: The three principal parts of verbs are the * present form, the past form, and the past participle.
